- ii) What induced the poet to write his 'happy songs'?
- iii) Point out the similarity between the ending of "Dejection: An Ode" and that of "Tintern Abbey"
- iv) 'I turn from you, and listen to the wind'. What is it the poet turns from? How does the poet address the wind?

- v) Explain the imagery of a smithy in "The Tyger".
- vi) What is common to the child, the little lamb and God in "The Lamb"?
- vii) Why does Shelley urge the west wind to drive his 'dead thoughts over the universe'?
- viii) Describe how the autumn is personified as a harvester.
- ix) 'Until they think' —What will 'they' think?
- x) How does the poet describe the beaker containing the vintage?
- xi) 'Nor what soft incense hangs upon the boughs'—Name the two sensory images employed in the line.
- xii) Mention the source of the images in the last two lines of "Kubla Khan".
- xiii) The speaker in "Scots, Wha Hae" reminds his countrymen of the two great Scottish heroes. Who are they?
- xiv) Describe, after Robert Burns, the 'whim-inspired fool'.
- xv) What does the bright pole star watch with 'eternal lids apart'?

- iv) "Dejection: An Ode" is a pessimistic lament over the loss of poetic powers. Do you agree? Give a reasoned answer.
- v) Write a note on Burns' use of Scottish dialect in "Scots Wha Hae".
- vi) "The Chimney Sweeper" exposes the greed of the elders and a society whose Trinity is God, Priest and King. Discuss with a close reading of the text.
- vii) "Ode to the West Wind" is a prayer to the power of the west wind in the final section. Elucidate.
- viii) Illustrate the salient features of an ode with reference to any one of the odes prescribed in your syllabus.
- ix) Critically assess "Bright Star" as a sonnet.
